- 1. Diversity of age, race, ethnicity, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, language, experience, and national geography Babu is from India, a parent of an adult living with mental illness, retired sales professional with deep connection in the Rocky Mountain region.
- 2. Knowledge of the philanthropic community and track record with donor cultivation Babu has been an essential piece to our grants and funding growing from \$250,000 to \$750,000 as a result of building relationships with donor advised fundholders, foundation trustees, and corporate/faith partnerships.
- 3. Experience with a variety of revenue models and financial oversight and management Babu comes from the corporate world and understands and supports the strong financial operating standards and has embraced improving our compliance by adding an outside bookkeeper, internal ops director, and engaged accountant while attending, in an ex officio way, our budget finance and audit committee.
- 4. Human capital management Babu served in a transitional role between executive directors, working with the staff and attending staff meetings. His understanding of the value of hiring those with lived experience is strong and often reinforced.
- 5. Experience/expertise with social media: Babu reposts and shares resources via Facebook and LinkedIn having created a strong following, particularly with Asian Americans and faith based leaders.

The list of Babu's accomplishments is long and deep. He has an innate understanding of the role of board members in a governance model, embracing the leadership and guidance of a board as the staff grows operations and implements programs. He is constantly making connections and then transitioning those relationships to the appropriate staff person in order to engage the individual or organization in our advocacy, programs, education or support. Over the years as NSO president, Babu has attended our affiliate roundtables (monthly), public policy (biweekly), and family support (biweekly). This has put him front and center as a listener, able to pull in information from advocates and family members who want to be heard and have a collective voice. Most of all, Babu has taken the core elements of JEDI and FaithNet to constantly bring individuals to the table who can participate in our walk (leading his own Asian Americans for Mental Health team), our community conversations for persons of color, our Pathways to Hope and Speaker Series. When we get a concern about inequity or exclusiveness, Babu is by the ED's side in meeting with individuals one on one to ensure they feel heard and embraced. The support of Babu in having staff expand in order to add an affiliate relations specialist has shown the affiliates how we care about them and want to leverage the work they do. He has also shared models of governance, FaithNet, and JEID as secretary of the State President's Council and helped us be one of the few states with 2 reps on both the Peer Leadership and Service Members' councils. There is more capacity to answer our helpline, utilize our LawLine, train the trainers, advocate at the Capitol, leverage the Quorum database and tool, expand our support and education to virtual, in-person and hybrid...ultimately and in every way...meet people where they are at. Babu is the ultimate in achieving this and advances every piece of the NAMI mission in so doing.
